About us:

Editorial A Contracorriente, associated with the refereed on-line journal *A Contracorriente* (www.ncsu.edu/project/accontracorriente), publishes refereed books on Latin American studies in Spanish or English. We are a non-profit press that publishes single author monographs and edited volumes that address political, sociological, literary, historical, economic and cultural issues from innovative, progressive and critical points of view. As the name of the press indicates, we publish rigorous and solid works that question the prevailing trends in those fields.

Since *Editorial A Contracorriente* is non-profit we sell our books-on-demand at the price it costs to produce them. There are no royalties for authors nor are there profits for the press. We are able to accomplish this via Amazon.com. Once the manuscripts have been read by readers and approved for final publication, we send a pdf version of the manuscript, front cover and back cover to Amazon.com, which then takes care of the printing and binding of the paperback book. Amazon.com handles all the rest of the process as well. Once the book is ready, readers can find it on Amazon and purchase it as they would any book on that site with a credit card or ATM card, and Amazon will deliver it.

Details from Amazon about the book features:

*All book covers are printed in full-color on cover stock and finished with a protective laminate coating.

*Black and white books can be printed on white or cream (also called "off-white") paper).

*Full-color books are printed on white paper.

*Free CreateSpace ISBN is assigned if you do not already own one.

Information for authors:

1. A proposal, an outline or table of contents, and no more than two chapters of the manuscript should be sent to the Editors at the address below.

2. If the proposal and chapters meet the criteria of the press, the editors then ask to see the entire manuscript. Submitted manuscripts must include a title page, a table of contents, an acknowledgments page, numbered and titled chapters, works cited or complete footnotes, and may include photos or other graphics. The manuscript should be prepared according to the MLA style or Chicago style. The author is also responsible for proofreading and indexing the manuscript.
3. The editors read the manuscript and send it out to at least two readers. (Edited volumes comprising articles in our journal *A contracorriente* will not need to be externally reviewed.)
4. The press receives the readers' reports and sends them to the author. The readers may recommend that, 1) The work is publishable as it is; 2) The work is publishable but requires changes; 3) The work is not worthy of publication. In cases of conflicting reports, the editors will make the final judgement.
5. The author whose work has been deemed publishable with changes, makes the requested changes to the manuscript and sends it back to the press.
6. The editors verify that the changes to the manuscript have been made and prepare the volume for publication (this includes formatting and copy-editing).
7. The editors create a book cover, print the manuscript as a pdf, and send it to Amazon.com.
8. The press informs readers on the journal site (www.ncsu.edu/project/acontracorriente) that the book-on-demand can be purchased on Amazon.com.
9. The copyright remains with the press.
