DROP FOR NON-ATTENDANCE POLICY

Students enrolled in courses in the College of Management (ACC, BUS, EC) and the College of Humanities and Social Sciences will be subject to the following Drop for Non-Attendance Policy. This policy will apply to courses where student demand exceeds enrollment capacity. **DO NOT ASSUME YOU WILL BE DROPPED.** Students who intend to drop a course must officially drop through MyPack Portal or they maintain the financial and academic obligations associated with being registered.

By the second class/laboratory period or the fifth business day of the semester (whichever comes first) students who have not attended class or contacted the instructor regarding his/her absence may be dropped from the class roll. This drop will be initiated by the Associate Dean of the College upon the request of the instructor. The student may petition for readmission to the class if s/he has been dropped in error, or in the event of extenuating circumstances, provided the request is received by the tenth business day of the semester.

ENROLLMENT (REGISTRATION)

Enrollment Access

Enrollment (Registration) is controlled by specific window access or Enrollment Dates. Enrollment dates are divided for each undergraduate classification based upon total hours passed at the time of enrollment. Each student has an assigned specific day and time they are to enroll, which they need to check in MyPack Portal.

You cannot enroll before your Enrollment Date is scheduled. Access will be denied if you try to enroll earlier than the date indicated. Classification is based on your hours passed when your enrollment opens-- not at the end of the current semester. You may enroll anytime after your enrollment window opens. Students with past due debts or any "Holds" must be cleared by the Cashier's Office in 2005 Harris Hall to enroll.

Total hours passed is available through MyPack Portal. Window opening dates are available in this booklet and online at www.ncsu.edu/registrar/calendars/index.html.

Enrollment Dates

Your Enrollment Date is the specific day and time that you can begin registration for the upcoming semester. This is not a reserved time to meet with your advisor. You should meet with your advisor prior to their Enrollment Date. NDS students do not have assigned advisors and will gain access to Enrollment during the NDS Open Enrollment period.

Students must check their Enrollment Date in MyPack Portal. To view, log into MyPack Portal and go to: Student Self Service > Enrollment > Enrollment Dates. General start dates will be published in the Enrollment Calendar online: www.ncsu.edu/registrar/calendars.

Enrollment dates are assigned 8a.m. – 4p.m., Monday through Friday. Enrollment Dates are determined by hours passed (not attempted hours).

COORDINATORS OF ADVISING

Each college or department has a coordinator of advising who is responsible for: (1) assigning, training, and supervising faculty advisers; (2) providing up-to-date, printed course and curriculum information for advisers and students; (3) reassigning to another adviser any student who so requests; and (4) assisting any student who wants to major in the coordinator's area of study but is ineligible at the time to transfer into it. Students who have made a conscientious effort to contact their faculty adviser but are unable to do so, should consult with the appropriate coordinator of advising from the list below. The coordinator of advising should be able to assist advisees in obtaining (a) the information needed, (b) assistance in arranging a meeting with their adviser, or (c) assignment to a new adviser. In the absence of the coordinator of advising, consult the appropriate department head.

Courses may be changed or canceled based on demand. Classroom assignments may also be changed based on reasonable accommodations. Please refer to the copy of your schedule on MyPack Portal at www.ncsu.edu/registrar.

Online Course Listings

The Schedule of Courses is available online at www.ncsu.edu/registrar/courses. Courses are arranged alphabetically by departmental abbreviation (prefix) and numerically by course number. Classes have the time shown as the beginning and ending time of the class period; for example 8:05 to 8:55 MWF (Mon, Wed, Fri) or 10:15 to 11:30 TH (Tues,Thurs).

Course Load

The maximum course load for undergraduate degree students is 21 credit hours in a semester and two courses plus a physical education course in a summer session. **Undergraduate students who want to enroll (register) for more than 18 credit hours in a semester must have their academic advisers complete the appropriate waiver from Registration and Records.** To carry more than the 21 credit hour maximum, students must obtain the approval of their academic advisers and of their college deans. Graduate students may carry a maximum of 15 credit hours. The maximum load for all nondegree students (UGS and PBS) is two academic courses, plus one physical education course.

The minimum course load for a full-time undergraduate degree student is 12 hours, except in their final semester when a lesser number is required for graduation. The minimum load for a full-time graduate student is 9 credit hours. In order to receive financial aid, a student must meet the minimum course load requirements of the appropriate funding agency.

Course Level

Freshmen courses are numbered 100 - 199; sophomore courses are numbered 200 - 299; junior and senior courses are numbered 300 - 499. Courses numbered 500 - 600 are taught at the Masters level and most are available to advanced undergraduates. Doctoral courses are numbered 700 - 899. **Graduate courses numbered at the 500 and 700 levels are letter graded (A+ ... F), while 600 and 800 level courses are S/U graded.** Courses regularly letter

graded (A+ ... F) may not be taken for S/U grading by graduate students. Courses numbered in the 900 series are open to College of Veterinary Medicine students.

Footnotes

Some courses are shown in the Schedule of Courses with a note highlighting special restrictions or information. Please remember that you are responsible for being aware of these requirements when you enroll (register).

Prerequisites

Many course sections have mandatory prerequisites which are listed in the course catalog. Each student is responsible for meeting the published prerequisites for each course requested. After each enrollment period, colleges and departments may review the completion of prerequisites of enrolled (registered) students. The academic units have the authority to administratively drop a student who has not fulfilled the published prerequisites.

Students should contact the department of the course they are interested in if they have any questions regarding the prerequisites.

ENROLLMENT (REGISTRATION) INFORMATION

Continuing Degree Students

If you are a currently enrolled degree student, either undergraduate or graduate, you must enroll (register) using MyPack Portal. Students must meet with their advisor to have their Advising Hold released prior to their Enrollment Date.

New Undergraduate and Graduate Degree Students

If you are a new undergraduate (freshman or transfer) or graduate degree student cleared for admission, you will complete enrollment (registration) using MyPack Portal. The enrollment process can be completed via the Internet at www.ncsu.edu/registrar.

If you are a new undergraduate student (freshman or transfer), the coordinator of advising in your respective college will release your advising (enrollment) hold. A list of coordinators is provided on pages 7 - 8 . If you are a new graduate student, you must contact the graduate administrator in your respective department to have your Advising Hold released. You should then enroll using MyPack Portal.

Progress Toward Undergraduate Degree

As of fall 2006, all undergraduate degree-seeking students who entered either as first-time freshmen or transfers are subject to the Progress Toward Undergraduate Degree regulation. Failure to maintain compliance with the regulation will result in the student being placed on Progress Warning status and could result in the loss of status as a degree-seeking student. Progress Toward Degree is tracked with the Automated Degree Audit (ADA) located on MyPack Portal. For complete information see: www.ncsu.edu/policies/academic_affairs/pols_regs/REG205.00.20.php

Non-Degree Studies Students

If you are a student that is not formally admitted to a degree program, you would be categorized as a Non-Degree Studies student. This general classification is divided into two categories, **Undergraduate Studies student (UGS) or Post-Baccalaureate Studies student (PBS)**, depending on whether or not the student already has a baccalaureate degree.

These students are required to adhere to the academic standards, policies, and procedures, add/drop/withdrawal deadlines, etc., which apply to all NC State students. Also, non-degree students may enroll in any course provided they have satisfied any required prerequisites and the class is not restricted to degree students only. PBS students who seek advising may contact the Director of Graduate Programs for their area of interest. Additional requirements can be found online for both UGS and PBS students.

For an application or more information, visit the website at www.ncsu.edu/nds. You will be charged a \$25.00 nonrefundable fee at the end of the application.

Distance Education Credit Courses (DE)

A number of NC State University courses are available off campus through DVD, cable TV, Internet, and live off-campus instruction. These courses provide academic credit toward

educational goals. Complete graduate programs are available as well as individual courses at all levels, in many disciplines. For additional information, please visit the Distance Education website at www.distance.ncsu.edu/.

Readmission of Former Degree Students

If you are a previously enrolled undergraduate degree student but did not attend the 2010 Spring Semester, you must complete a readmission application and have received an official notice of readmission before attempting to enroll (register). You will be charged a \$50.00 nonrefundable fee at the end of the application.

Graduate Students returning from a previously approved leave of absence at the approved time should contact their academic program department prior to attempting to enroll in classes. Graduate Students who have “stopped-out” without a prior approved leave of absence or are attempting to return in an academic term later than previously approved, must submit a new application to the Graduate School due to a break in residency and non-compliance with continuous registration requirements.

Readmission applications are online at www.ncsu.edu/registrar/readmission/index.html. Readmission applications should be submitted as soon as possible but no later than 30 days prior to the date of desired enrollment. You should be aware that enrollment restrictions may be imposed at any time which may affect your readmission.

Once you have received your notice of readmission, you should enroll using MyPack Portal. You must have your advising hold released by the coordinator of advising in your respective college prior to enrollment.

Students with Disabilities

Students desiring reasonable accommodations for their documented disabilities should contact the Disability Services Office (DSO), Suite 1900, Student Health Center, 2815 Cates Avenue, (919) 515-7653 (voice), (919) 515-8830 (TTY), website: www.ncsu.edu/dso.

Veterans' Certification

Students eligible for Veterans' educational benefits while attending NC State are required to verify their attendance through the VA Certifying Official, 1000 Harris Hall, (919) 515-3048 or online at www.ncsu.edu/veterans. Veterans should notify the VA Certifying Official immediately if their status changes (including change of major, addresses, or if any modifications are made to their schedules).

Cooperative Registration Programs (Inter-Institutional)

Cooperative Registration Programs are available through Cooperating Raleigh Colleges and Inter-institutional Enrollment. Information and enrollment forms may be obtained from Registration and Records' website: www.ncsu.edu/registrar/inter-institutional, or in person at 1000 Harris Hall. Course enrollment (registration) or course withdrawal cannot be made using the MyPack Portal system.

ENROLLMENT (REGISTRATION) PROCESS

1. Determine course requirements and release advising hold

Degree Students

Students should meet with their advisors prior to their Enrollment Date. Although it is your responsibility for planning your program and meeting degree requirements, advisors can offer valuable advise to help you achieve your goals. At your advising conference, your advisor will release your Advising Hold so you can enroll in courses during your Enrollment Date (check Enrollment Date in MyPack Portal).

Non-Degree Studies students

If you are a currently enrolled Non-Degree Studies student, you are already eligible for enrollment in courses and will begin during the designated NDS Enrollment time (see Enrollment Calendar). New and reentering Non-Degree students will be notified by Registration and Records via e-mail when their application is processed and they are cleared for enrollment

2. Plan your schedule and enroll (register) in courses

Work out a class schedule that has no time conflicts. List the

courses in priority order with all pertinent information for easy reference. You may find it desirable to list courses with the fewest sections first. You also need to prepare alternative courses just in case some classes are full. You may enroll through MyPack Portal using the instructions provided. If for any reason you are not eligible to enroll, you will be given an explanation. **Students with past due debts or any "Holds" must be cleared by the Cashier's Office in 2005 Harris Hall to enroll.**

3. Make your payment

Log in to MyPack Portal to view your eBILL. You are responsible for full payment of tuition, fees and all other debts to the university and for clearing all "Holds" by the due date on your bill. Failure to pay tuition, fees, and all other debts to the university and to clear all "Holds" may result in your schedule being cancelled. Do not assume your course(s) will be canceled. It is your responsibility to contact the Cashier's Office, determine your balance and due date, and pay even if you do not receive a bill. All e-mail contact from the university is defaulted to your NCSU provided unity account. To ensure proper mailing address, update your home/ mailing address through MyPack Portal.

IMPORTANT ENROLLMENT (REGISTRATION) TERMS

Wait List - If you have placed yourself on a wait list, that day and time have been reserved in your schedule. **You cannot add another section of that course or another course that meets at the same day and time.** Wait listed hours will be included in tuition and fee charges. After the tuition due date, students who have not paid in full will be dropped from their courses. Seats opened by these cancelations will be filled by students on wait lists. Check for wait list drop date on Enrollment Calendar at www.ncsu.edu/registrar/calendars.

Variable Credit - When a course is for variable credit you can choose how many credit hours you would like the course to be worth. Courses with variable credit show a number range for "Units" in the **CLASS DETAILS** section for the class. You will not be allowed to register for less than the minimum, more than the maximum, or a fraction of a credit hour.

Scheduling Restrictions - Departments may choose to limit the number of available seats. Enrollment requirements are published in the schedule of classes at the discretion of the department that offers the course. If students have questions about restrictions, they should contact the department that offers the course. A description of the class restrictions are available on the **ENROLLMENT INFORMATION** section and seats available for the class is listed in the **CLASS AVAILABILITY** section.

Permission to Add - For enrollment of courses that require instructor or departmental permission, the department teaching the course will either add you to the course online or issue you a **Schedule Revision Form** to be taken to Registration and Records, 1000 Harris Hall.

ENROLLMENT (REGISTRATION) PERIODS

Enrollment

First Summer Session (March 17 - April 26, 2011)

Second Summer Session (March 17 - June 2, 2011):

Students are expected to enroll using MyPack Portal during the Enrollment period. A statement of tuition, fees and other outstanding debts will be sent via eBILL to the student's university e-mail address.

Late Enrollment

First Summer Session (April 27 - May 25, 2011)

Second Summer Session (June 2 - July 5 2011):

Students enrolling for the first time for the 2011 Summer Sessions on or after April 26, 2011 (First Summer) or June 2, 2010 (Second Summer), will be assessed a \$35.00 Non-Refundable Late Enrollment Fee*. Enrolling creates a financial and academic commitment to NC State. Payment of tuition and fees will be requested at the time of enrollment.








NOTE: Enrolling for classes after the last day to enroll is strictly prohibited. After this day, students will need permission from the dean of their college and be subject to additional late fees.

*PBS, UGS, Inter-Institutional, new undergraduate and new graduate students are excluded from the late enrollment fee.



-  Open www.ncsu.edu/registrar in your computer's web browser.
-  Click on the MyPack Portal icon.
-  Access to MyPack Portal requires a valid Unity ID and password.
-  If you do not know your Unity ID and password, contact OIT at (919) 515-HELP (4357).
-  Once you have entered your login and password, select Enrollment from the Enrollment menu under Student Self Service OR the FOR STUDENTS tab in MyPack Portal.
-  Access to Enrollment requires that you meet with your advisor. The advisor will release your **Advising Hold** so you will be eligible for enrollment during your assigned time. See your assigned appointment or enrollment time by clicking **Enrollment Date** in the navigation menu. Enrollment Dates are set just before the official enrollment period begins.
-  During your enrollment appointment, you may **Add a class** by entering the (4-5 digit) **Class ID Number** or, if you do not know this number, you can search for classes.

-  Select Search for Classes (on the Add tab page to add directly into schedule) and click **SEARCH**.
-  Enter the **Class Search Criteria**, which includes Course Subject, Number and Career.



NOTE: To protect the privacy of your records, always **SIGN OUT** and close out your browser when you are finished.

SCHEDULE REVISION

Once you have initially enrolled (registered), you may make schedule revisions (drop/add) anytime MyPack Portal is operational. You are encouraged to make your schedule changes as soon as you are aware that they need to be made. To ensure easy access to MyPack Portal, please make changes as early as possible. Please refer to the Term (Semester) Calendar for official schedule revision dates.

NOTE: Upon adding course work that results in an increased rate, students will be billed during the next Cashier's Office billing cycle. Refunds resulting from courses dropped will be mailed to the student's university correspondence address. The last day for a tuition adjustment is the same as the last day to enroll (register), add without departmental approval, drop or change to audit. Courses dropped after this date are not eligible for a credit or refund. Students who drop all of their courses after the start of the semester (i.e. withdraw) will receive refunds based on the Cashier's Office withdrawal schedule listed on pg. 15.

NOTE: The use of MyPack Portal to alter any information on another person is a violation of the Student Code of Conduct and is subject to disciplinary action.

Adding Courses

Courses may be added during the first week of a semester without the permission of the instructor and during the second week with the permission of the instructor. In a summer session, courses may be added during the first two days and during the third and fourth days with permission of the instructor.

Dropping Courses

Courses may be dropped without regard to course load during the first two weeks of a regular semester. **Dropping all of the courses for which you are enrolled (registered) after the start of the semester constitutes withdrawing from the university. (See Withdrawal From the University)**

Full-Time Undergraduate Degree Students Dropping Courses During Weeks Three Through Eight

During weeks three through eight of a semester, a full-time undergraduate degree student who wishes to drop courses at any academic level and whose academic load would thereby fall below the twelve-hour minimum course load may do so only for documented medical reasons or other verified, unforeseen grounds of personal or family hardship as provided for under **Exceptions**. The minimum course load for undergraduate students is twelve credit hours except in their final semester when a lesser number may be taken if that is all that the student needs to fulfill graduation requirements. To receive financial aid, a student must meet the minimum course load requirements of the appropriate funding agency.

Deadline for Dropping Courses

Except as provided in the paragraph above, courses may be freely dropped during the first eight weeks of a semester. Thereafter, no drops shall be allowed except for documented medical reasons or other verified, unforeseen grounds of personal or family hardship as provided for under **Exceptions**.

NOTE: For mini-courses normally offered for one credit during one-third of a semester, the drop period shall end at the middle of the second week of

that particular course regardless of whether it is offered at the beginning, middle, or end of a regular semester.

Exceptions

For undergraduate students, exceptions to the drop policies above require the recommendation of the student's advisor (or the departmental coordinator of advising or the department head) and approval by the dean of the student's college. Students and advisors should check with the college dean's office concerning forms and procedures for requesting an exception.

For graduate students, exceptions to the drop policies require the recommendation of the chair of the student's advisory committee, the department head, approval by the dean of the students' college, and the dean of The Graduate School.

For non-degree students, exceptions to the drop policies must be handled through Registration and Records, 1000 Harris Hall.

WITHDRAWAL FROM THE UNIVERSITY

Once the semester begins, students who wish to drop all course work for which they are enrolled must officially withdraw from the university. **Degree students do not use MyPack Portal.** Undergraduate and graduate degree students should contact the Counseling Center to initiate an official withdrawal. Dean's approval and even parental approval in certain cases may be required.

Non-Degree Studies students should initiate withdrawal through MyPack Portal: Student Self Service > Enrollment > Term Withdrawal to submit the withdrawal. NDS students with questions regarding withdrawal should contact Registration and Records.

After the close of the official drop period, withdrawals may only be granted for exceptional circumstances such as documented medical or hardship situations. The last day to drop a course with a refund or reduction is May 26, 2010 (First Sum/Ten-week) and July 6, 2010 (Second Sum) both at 11:59 p.m.

All Non-Degree Undergraduate Studies (NDS-UGS) students are charged at the undergraduate rate for on-campus courses. Non-Degree Post-Baccalaureate Studies (NDS-PBS) students who enroll in 100 - 400 level courses **only** are also charged at the undergraduate rate. NDS-PBS students who enroll in any 500 - 800 level courses are charged at the graduate rate for **all** courses for which they are registered.

Official Withdrawals

Refunds for official withdrawals from NC State University are prorated and no refunds are made for official withdrawals after 50% of the enrollment period. Refunds will be processed after the last day to enroll (register/add/drop).

Students who withdraw due to extenuating circumstances may be eligible to file an application for refund. The deadline for filing a refund appeal application is the the last day of exams for the session registered.
